PUMPKIN BREAD

INGREDIENTS

- 3/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 2 large eggs
- 1 can (15 oz.) LIBBY'S® 100% Pure Pumpkin
- 1 can (12 fl. oz.) NESTLÉ® CARNATION® Evaporated Milk
- 1 *unbaked* 9-inch (4-cup volume) deep-dish pie shell



Whipped cream (optional)

Recipe:

MIX sugar, cinnamon, salt, ginger and cloves in small bowl. Beat eggs in large bowl. Stir in pumpkin and sugar-spice mixture. Gradually stir in evaporated milk.

POUR into pie shell.

BAKE in preheated 425° F oven for 15 minutes. Reduce temperature to 350° F; bake for 40 to 50 minutes or until knife inserted near center comes out clean. Cool on wire rack for 2 hours. Serve immediately or refrigerate. Top with whipped cream before serving.

- Does rap music have a negative impact on youth?





Here's a look at what some of the students were saying about the dilemmas of the month...

Do you see cloning as a threat or an opportunity?

"I see it as a threat because we are playing God and making something not natural" - Teacher
